1 Family Foster Home (FFH) identifies and selects a sponsoring Child Placing Agency (CPA)

The FFH can contact CPAs directly, or through DCF or the Children's Alliance of Kansas (CAK)



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


The FFH goes through orientation with its chosen sponsoring CPA

- → Policy/procedure
- Prelicensure training
 - TIPS MAPP/Deciding Together
 - 2) Medication Administration
 - 3) First Aid
 - 4) Universal Precautions

- → CPA completes home visit
 - 1) Regulation compliance
 - 2) Family Assessment interviews
- → Other tasks
 - 1) Fingerprints
 - 2) Health assessments
 - 3) TB tests
 - 4) Immunization records
 - 5) Pet vaccination records

2 CPA submits application materials to DCF electronically



- 3 DCF assigns licensing surveyor
 - Surveyor contacts FFH, then schedules and completes onsite survey within 15 days of assignment







5 DAYS TO BECOME COMPLIANT OR SUBMIT PLANS FOR COMPLIANCE

4 License issuance → child placement

REQUIRED FOR ISSUANCE

- Survey completion
- Verification of compliance
- Background checks & fingerprinting



Average time for license issuance is 3 business days upon verification of compliance.

DURING COVID-19 If survey was completed virtually, a temporary permit may be issued, and an onsite visit must occur within 90 days.

Once the license is issued, the child(ren) may be placed in the family foster home.

5 Foster parent training



- Each foster parent must complete 8 hours of training per year.
 - ➤ 2 of those hours must be instructor-led (available virtually during COVID-19)



DCF contracts with the Children's Alliance of Kansas (CAK) to coordinate and offer training opportunities for foster parents across the state.

- CAK directly offers classes on a variety of topics and works in partnership with CPAs to provide training
- All potential foster or adoptive families must complete a pre-service course, either TIP-MAPP (Trauma Informed Partnering for Safety and Permanence Model Approach to Partnerships in Parenting) or Deciding Together
- All potential foster parents must also complete:
 - Universal Precautions

- Medication Administration
- First Aid/CPR
- CAK and CPAs offer additional classes on topics such as:
 - Child development
 - The effects of trauma
 - Ethical relationships in child welfare
 - Stress management
 - Mental health
 - Culturally specific hair care

- 6 Annual onsite visit
 - → Scheduled and conducted by DCF licensing surveyor



- A. Verify compliance with regulations
- B. Verify required records are on file
- C. Verify required training hours were completed

7 Complaint investigations



- Interviews conducted with foster parent, foster child(ren), sponsoring CPA staff, case management staff, and any other collateral contacts
- Unannounced onsite visit to verify compliance (if non-compliant, FFH/CPA have 5 days to submit corrections or plan of corrections for returning to compliance)

Complaints come through multiple pathways: Kansas Protection Report Center, critical incidents, direct reports to DCF licensing (by phone, email, in-person, or customer service ticket).



A non-related kinship (NRKIN) is a person identified as having a relationship with the child or child's family as defined in PPS policy.

NRKIN follows the same process as Family Foster Home Licensure, except that it allows a child to be placed into the home prior to license issuance.

- 1 Sponsoring CPA locates NRKIN
 - The CMP division of the CPA gathers information from the family and child(ren) regarding potential relative/kin options



Name-based background checks




Walkthrough of the home



Child is placed

2 Application for licensure submitted to DCF within 14 days of child's placement



- 3 Temporary permit issued when background checks are clear
 - → Valid for 90 days
 - → Second temporary permit can be issued for another 90 days

- 4 DCF assigns licensing surveyor
 - Surveyor contacts FFH, then schedules and completes onsite survey within 30 days







5 DAYS TO BECOME COMPLIANT OR SUBMIT PLANS FOR COMPLIANCE

5 License issuance

REQUIRED FOR ISSUANCE

- Verification of compliance
- Completion of prelicensure training



NRKIN must complete prelicensure training and be in full compliance within 180 days to receive a license.

6 Foster parent training



- → Each foster parent must complete 8 hours of training per year.
 - ➤ 2 of those hours must be instructor-led (available virtually during COVID-19)

7 Annual onsite visit

→ Scheduled and conducted by DCF licensing surveyor



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EXCEPTIONS TO REGULATIONS







- As much as is possible while ensuring that children are safe, DCF strives to work alongside family foster homes to help them achieve licensure
- Exceptions to licensing regulations may be requested
- Exceptions may be granted on a case by case basis if the Secretary determines that

the exception is in the best interest of a child in foster care and the exception does not violate statutory requirements

An exception should identify all information to support the request and document the intent of the regulation is met, and assures health, safety and welfare


RELATIVE PLACEMENTS



- Relatives serving as placement are not required to be licensed, but may choose to become licensed as a family foster home if they desire
- However, Kansas does not currently allow for any regulations to be waived for relative placements, making the licensure process difficult for some relatives
- DCF and agency partners are shifting to a Kin-First perspective which seeks to make every child's first (and ideally only) placement be with kin

- Streamlining the licensure process for relatives will help increase supports and subsidies available for relatives providing care, which will ultimately ensure better placement stability and long-term permanency
- Efforts to accomplish this goal include:
 - Review of existing program and practices
 - Identifying statutory barriers to relative licensure
 - Potentially waiving non-safety regulations for relatives

RESPITE CARE



- Family foster home regulations allow a family to, if they choose, provide short term respite care to foster children
- Children may need respite care as they transition between placements or when a foster parent needs a break
- Short term respite is defined as care for less than 24 hours per week for a child
- → Short term respite regulation allows a

- family foster home to exceed their licensed capacity by a sibling group of any size or by 2 children
- For long term respite care (longer than 24 hours), regulation requires the home maintain their licensed capacity
- There is no existing license type specific to a respite facility, any family foster home may choose to accept respite placements
