SECTION ONE: EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Every three years, the Kansas Department for Children and Families (DCF) conducts a Child Care Market Rate Analysis to determine the distribution of rates for child care across the state. The following highlights information reported in the current study.

- Across all Kansas providers, child care benefits supported by DCF are subsidized at the 50th - 75th percentile. While the subsidy remains less than the amount charged by some providers, rate adjustments by DCF have narrowed the gap when compared to the 2017 study.
- While the subsidy remains less than the amount charged by some providers, cost area designations for each county are determined by DCF based on child care rates, age of child, and facility type. Current cost area designations and proposed changes resulting from this study are shown below.

The 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey was administered to providers across the state to capture information not available through other data sources. Highlights are summarized below.

- Of the providers who responded they knew about the DCF Child Care Subsidy Program, 77.5% of Child Care Centers and 63.6% of Family Child Care Providers report participation.
- Of the 43.2% of providers who reported receiving additional funding, the majority of funding reported by both provider types was COVID/Pandemic Related.
- Child Care Centers are more likely than Family Child Care Providers to charge additional fees, with 62.3% of Child Care Centers reporting they charge additional fees compared to 23.3% of Family Child Care Providers.
- Nearly 48.0% (47.7%) of Child Care Centers and 70.7% of Family Child Care Providers report participation in the Child and Adult Care Food Program.
- Only 7.4% of child care providers reported they provide alternative hour care.

SECTION TWO: INTRODUCTION

The Kansas Department for Children and Families (DCF) designs and oversees programs to help Kansas families access child care services. One of these programs is the Child Care Subsidy Program that helps some families pay for child care costs. DCF subsidizes a portion of the child care expenses incurred by some low-income families. These subsidies allow low-income families to participate in training programs, attend school, or maintain employment. Child care rates are based in part on local market rates of child care, as determined by market rate analyses. These analyses are used to obtain rate information as well as other information about the child care setting. Since changes do occur within the market over time, a rate study is completed every three years.

DCF has contracted with the Learning Tree Institute at Greenbush (LTI) to analyze the local market rates of regulated child care throughout the state of Kansas. The analysis provides information on whether current state rates and county groupings are adequate to allow families equal purchasing power in the child care market.

Child Care Aware of Kansas (CCAKS) is the child care resource and referral agency that collects child care rate data. Rate information, and other data, from Child Care Aware of Kansas was used for the market analysis whenever available. Information that was not available through Child Care Aware of Kansas was obtained through a survey designed and administered by LTI, with final edits determined by the administrative and communications staff of DCF. The survey is referred to throughout the document as the 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey.

Organization of the Report

This report is organized by section. Section One includes the Executive Summary. Section Two includes the Introduction. Section Three describes how existing data were used to calculate median rates and any conversions, as well as the methodology used to collect new survey data as requested to provide additional information regarding child care provider practices. Section Four includes the results of the study, folding in new data with existing data to answer questions outlined in the study's scope of work. Section Five includes recommendations for cost area changes and considerations for future market rate analysis. The final section is a series of appendices that provide information on median rates by county, cost areas, age category, and other supporting documentation. Detailed information and frequency tables from the new survey questions are included in Appendix 9: Results of the 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey.

SECTION 3: METHODOLOGY

Market Rate Analysis

The goal of the Kansas Child Care Market Rate Analysis is to determine the distribution of rates for child care across the state based on various child care provider types, their demographics, and geography. Child Care Aware of Kansas maintains data related to child care rates and hours of operation by provider type and age of child. This information, as well as data regarding accreditation, alternative hour care, and Child and Adult Care Food Program participation were used in the current market rate analysis. The data are from the summer of 2020.

Survey Development

To collect and analyze data not currently available, the Research and Evaluation Department of the Learning Tree Institute at Greenbush (LTI) developed a survey on behalf of the Kansas Department for Children and Families (DCF). The survey was developed with both print and electronic distribution options. An initial survey draft was submitted by LTI to the DCF Child Care Subsidy Program Manager and DCF Communications Department, who provided guidance and determined final survey content. The survey intended to gather information to answer the following questions:

- 1. By provider type, what fees (if any) do child care providers charge to families for enrollment/registration, activity fees, transportation and other purposes, including the frequency and amounts charged?
- 2. By provider type, to what extent do child care providers participating in the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) subsidy program charge families receiving subsidy amounts greater than their required copayment/family share amount (differences between private pay rates and DCF rates)?
- 3. To what extent do child care providers offer discounts or negotiate a lower rate than their private-pay rate for an individual child for families receiving subsidies as well as other families? For those who do negotiate a lower rate or offer discounts, what factors are considered in determining discounts or negotiations of lower rates, such as subsidy eligibility, multiple children in a family or employee discounts? What additional sources of funding besides subsidy and parent payments (if any) are used?

The electronic survey was developed using SurveyGizmo software. The paper version was created in Word using an export from SurveyGizmo. To aid in the administration, and to reduce participants' time, multiple question skip procedures were included on the electronic survey which required extensive testing to ensure

appropriate performance. The survey was tested internally by the LTI Research and Evaluation Department staff. Detailed results can be found in Appendix 9: Results of the *2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey*.

Survey Sampling and Distribution

The initial study design and sampling procedures were based on data from the 2017 Child Care Market Rate Study. LTI proposed two stratified samples with proportional area allocations. Initial sample sizes were based on the comprehensive list provided by the Kansas Department of Health and Environment (KDHE) in the summer of 2020. A full census approach was taken to ensure the full universe of providers in the child care market had an equal opportunity to participate.

Following survey best practices, DCF sent a survey pre-notification email invitation to all child care providers in mid-August 2020. The invitation notified providers of the upcoming survey from LTI while encouraging and thanking them for participation. After the notification, LTI sent an email with a survey link to all providers with valid email addresses (4,432) on September 15, 2020. A follow-up email was sent to non-respondents on September 21, 2020.

As a secondary follow-up measure, DCF sent out a second reminder via email to providers on September 30, 2020, asking them to complete the survey if they had not already done so. As a result of that follow-up initiative, LTI received requests from 112 child care providers who reported interest in completing the survey and asked the link be resent.

The KDHE provider list, which was used to contact providers, revealed a large number of facilities (200) were tied to six email addresses. These facilities, which represented primarily Building Based School Age programs in larger communities, were called in an effort to obtain overall program and facility-level data.

To ensure all providers had an equal chance of participation, those without a valid email address were sent a paper copy on September 15, 2020. One hundred and one (101) surveys with pre-paid return envelopes were mailed to providers that did not have email addresses. Twenty-three providers responded via mail. Data collected through mail were logged directly into the SurveyGizmo survey. Analysis of different modes of responding did not reveal significant differences in responses.

Final Sample/Response Rate Analysis

A database was constructed by LTI that merged information collected from the online and paper surveys. All survey responses were reviewed for viability. Surveys were considered complete if they answered the first question in the last section of the survey, which was designed to capture data for the Narrow Cost Analysis.

Survey question type varied according to the data being requested. Multiple choice options were used when feasible while others were open-ended and allowed providers to write-in information. Open-ended questions had to be edited in some cases to make for consistent response categories. LTI used a conservative approach and did not change data unless the intent of response was clearly known. Editing methods included:

- Converting rates to and from daily, weekly, hourly, and monthly in a consistent manner to match rate data received from Child Care Aware of Kansas
- Extraneous characters were removed from rate entries, as were those where the intent was unclear. Blank responses and those entered as "0" were also removed
- When the answer provided to a question contained a range, the mean was used in most instances.

Final Sample Size

A total of 1,031 child care providers responded to the survey across the state for a 21.6% overall response, representing 25.5% of all facilities, which is within the normal range of response rates for a survey of this type. Eight hundred and ten (810) surveys were complete and 221 were partially completed for an overall completion rate of 78.6%.

Twenty-four (24) child care providers indicated they no longer provide child care. Because demographic and other information such as provider type and county information was not collected, those responses are not represented in the tables.

Distribution of survey responses by child care provider type are as follows:

- Building Based School Age Program (3.0% or 30)
- Child Care Center (18.5% or 186)
- Family Day Care Home (49.5% or 498)
- Group Day Care Home (24.8% or 250)
- Head Start Child Care Center (0.8% or 8)
- Preschool (3.5% or 35)

The geographic distribution of responses was also examined. Responses from 92 counties in the state (87.6%) were provided. With the exception of Rawlins who had ten providers, all counties with no response had seven or fewer providers according to the "Kansas Child Care Program Data" report published by Child Care Aware of Kansas on December 6, 2019.

Providers are grouped into one of three county groupings/cost areas. The cost areas reflect similar private pay rates among counties. The current three county groupings/cost areas reflect 1) High-cost, 2) Mid-cost, and 3) Low-cost. The tables below summarize the rate of response within each cost area for Family Child Care (Table 1) and Child Care Centers

(Table 2). Response rates were comparable between provider types by area and proportionate to type of providers in the state.

As stated previously in the Survey Sampling and Distribution section of this report, some organizations in Kansas run multiple facilities. Those multiple facilities are overseen by the same regional governing body (i.e. Boys and Girls Clubs and YMCAs). There are six surveys in the "Total Surveys Received" column in Table 2 which represent multiple facilities in the "Total Facilities Represented" column. Due to the burden of filling out one survey per facility in larger organizations that have multiple facilities, and the effect that the COVID-19 pandemic has had on school-age programs, administrators of these facilities completed a phone interview with a staff member of LTI in order to ascertain information about capacity and licensure, as well as building-specific and organization-wide policies.

The interviews with representatives who run multiple Building Based School Age programs revealed several commonalities. As of the time of the calls in mid-October, more than half of the facilities were not operating due to the school districts in which they were associated hosting classes remotely and not offering in-person options. Some administrators hoped to be open in the coming weeks but were unsure when that would occur. Additionally, KDHE guidance associated with COVID reduced the capacity of many school-age programs. These challenges make it difficult to quantify the landscape of school-age care, as it is greatly fluctuating from week to week. A more in-depth look at school-age programs is

recommended for study once programming returns to normal.

The number of facilities represented in the survey sample are in Table 3. Included in the count is an organization in Cost Area 3 who reported to LTI they completed one survey which represented their two facilities. This was treated similarly to the Building Based School Age programs described above. All facilities impacted are defined as Child Care Centers.

One organization that ran fifteen separate facilities in Cost Area 2 was also contacted. They were not interested in survey participation, and therefore their numbers are not represented in any of the tables.

SECTION 4: RESULTS

Child Care Status

Of the 1,031 respondents to the 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey, 97.7% (1,007) indicated they were still providing child care at the time of survey administration. Of the 26 who were no longer providing care, business complications due to COVID-19 (8) and personal reasons, such as retirement or health concerns (7) were cited most often as the reasons for closing their business.

Seventy-two percent (72.0% or 717) of the 996 providers who responded to the question about nonprofit or for-profit status reported they were a for-profit business. There was a substantial difference between Child Care Centers and Family Child Care Providers, as 83.8% of Family Child Care Providers reported running for-profit programs while only 37.9% of Child Care Centers were for-profit.

Child Care Provider Types

Kansas categorizes its regulated providers into two groups: Child Care Centers and Family Child Care Providers. Table 4 outlines the provider types used to classify providers as either a Child Care Center or Family Child Care Provider. These categories are defined by KDHE.

Child care facilities within the Child Care Center category include: Building Based School Age Programs, Child Care Centers, Head Start Centers, and Preschools. Child Care Centers are designated as child care facilities in which care and educational activities are provided for 13 or more children two weeks to 16 years of age for more than three hours and less than 24 hours per day. Building Based School Age Programs provide before and after school care for school-aged children. Preschools are designated as child care facilities that provide learning experiences for children who have not attained the age of eligibility to enter kindergarten, and who are 30 months of age or older; which conducts sessions not exceeding three hours per session; which does not enroll any child more than one session

per day; and which does not serve a meal. Centers who receive funding through the Head Start program also fall under this designation and are identified as Head Start Centers.

Family Child Care Providers are broken down into two types. A Family Child Care Provider-Licensed (aka Licensed Day Care Home) is a child care facility in which care is provided for a maximum of ten (10) children under 16 years of age. A Family Child Care Provider-Group (aka Group Day Care Home) is a child care facility in which care is provided for a maximum of twelve (12) children under 16 years of age. The total number of children in care at any one time for both these designations are based on the ages of the children in care.

An exempt child care facility is one in which the Department of Health and Environment has determined that child care licensing is not required.

Please see Appendix 1: Count of Providers by Type and County, for a summary of providers by type and licensed category in each Kansas county.

Age Categories as Defined for Calculation

LTI calculated median provider rates by age using the categories listed in Table 5 for Family Child Care Providers and Table 6 for Child Care Centers.

With the exception of calculation of benefits, all analyses were calculated based on Child Care Aware of Kansas age group descriptions shown in column two in Table 6. To adjust for incongruence in age categories between the benefit data in column one and the provider rate data in column two, weights were applied when comparing market rates to subsidies. Weights proportionate to months of actual age were used to make age categories as accurate and comparable as possible.

Age Categories as Defined by Child Care Providers

In order to assist DCF in determining age categories, providers were asked to define their age categories for infants, toddlers, and preschool-aged children in the 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey.

The majority of Child Care Centers (47.9%) considered an infant from 0 months to 12 months of age while the majority of Family Child Care Providers (60.8%) considered an infant to be from 0 months to 18 months in age. Nearly 43.0% (42.9%) of reporting Child Care Centers indicated they do not provide child care for infants while only 5.4% of Family Child Care Providers reported they do not provide child care for infants.

The majority of Child Care Centers considered a toddler to be from 12 months to 30 months (24.8%) or 12 months to 36 months (26.9%) in age, while the majority of Family Child Care Providers (43.2%) considered a toddler to be from 18 months to 36 months in age. Just over 30.0% (30.3%) of reporting Child Care Centers indicated they do not provide child care for toddlers while only 0.6% of Family Child Care Providers reported they do not provide child care for toddlers.

Both Child Care Centers and Family Child Care Providers considered a preschooler to be from 30 months to Kindergarten enrollment (26.9% for CCC and 22.5% for FCC) or 36 months to Kindergarten enrollment (29.8% for CCC and 31.8% for FCC). Eight percent (8.0%) of reporting Child Care Centers indicated they do not provide child care for preschoolers while only 1.7% of Family Child Care Providers reported they do not provide child care for preschoolers.

Description of Payment Options

In the 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey, child care providers reported options for family payment. The most common billing method for both Child Care Centers and Family Child Care Providers was weekly (59.9% for CCC and 79.9% for FCC). However, daily (30.4% for CCC and 51.6% for FCC) and monthly billing (38.6% for CCC and 34.0% for FCC) were also available as payment options. Fewer child care providers report hourly rates as an option for billing (9.7% for CCC and 13.5% for FCC).

Calculation of Median Rates – Full-Time, Part-Time, and Alternative Hours

Data from Child Care Aware of Kansas included rates of varying time intervals (e.g. hourly, daily, weekly, and monthly). To produce a common metric for reporting child care provider rates, all provided rates were converted to hourly. The current study calculates median rates for full-time providers and part-time providers.

Definition of Full-Time: Included in full-time are providers who met the following conditions:

- Reported valid full-time rates (hourly above \$1 and < \$10)
- Reported care available Monday through Friday
- Rendered services between 50-55 hours per week

If providers reported any valid full-time rate, rates were converted to hourly by dividing the daily rate by 10.4 (52 hours/5 days); weekly rate by 52 (hours/week); and monthly by 4.33 weeks per month and then divided by 52 hours per week. See Table 7.

Child care providers reported rates at different time intervals including hourly, daily, weekly, and monthly. Some providers reported rates in only one interval (such as hourly only) and others reported rates in multiple intervals (such as hourly and weekly). Some providers did not report a rate at all, and therefore, could not be included. The table below (Table 8) shows all time intervals reported by child care providers.

Definition of Part-Time as Defined for the Market Analysis: Part-time rates were calculated using the data from Child Care Aware of Kansas. All providers who provided a part-time rate were used in the analysis. Outliers were removed using the same criteria as full-time rates. See Appendix 3a: Part-Time Median Hourly Rate for county-level data.

Definition of Part-Time as defined by Child Care Providers: There was a large variance between respondents as to what was considered part-time care, which varied from 10 hours a week to 39 hours a week. When asked about part-time care, 20.6% of Child Care Centers and 28.1% of Family Child Care Providers do not differentiate between full-time and part-time care as they charge the full-time rate regardless of hours.

Definition of Full-Time as defined by Child Care Providers: There was a large variance between respondents as to what was considered full-time care, which varied from 15 hours a week to 50 hours a week. It is noteworthy that when asked about full-time care, the number of providers who reported they charged the full-time rate regardless of hours increased from the previous question, which asked about part-time hours. Nearly 35.0% (34.8%) of Child Care Centers and 38.5% of Family Child Care Providers reported they do not differentiate between full-time and part-time care as they charge the full-time rate regardless of hours.

Additional rate breakdowns by age group, county, and provider type can be found in the following Appendices: 3a: Part-Time Median Hourly Rate by Provider Type and County; 3b: Part-Time Median Hourly Rate by Age Group and County; 3c: Part-Time Median Daily Rate by Age Group and County; and 3d: Part-Time Weekly Rate by Age Group and County.

Definition of Alternative Hour Care: Currently, child care providers do not report to Child Care Aware of Kansas what hours they consider to be alternative hour care, nor do they report any increases in rates that are specific to hours they consider to be alternative.

According to the survey, 92.6% of child care providers reported they <u>did not</u> provide what they considered to be alternative hour care.

Providers who do provide alternative hour care report a variety of care options available. Of the 7.4% of providers who reported offering alternative hour care, the most reported options were: before and after school (85.7% for CCC and 75.5% for FCC); School days out (42.9% for CCC and 75.5% for FCC); and Drop-in care (52.4% for FCC and 71.6% for CCC). Overnight care was reported as being the least available, with only 4.8% of Child Care Centers and 8.8% of Family Child Care Providers reporting this option.

Table 11 shows the number of full-time providers who offer alternative hour care according to the data from Child Care Aware of Kansas, as defined by the *2017 Child Care Market Survey results*. Criteria was limited to providers who offered child care before 6:30 am, after 6 pm, and/or weekend care.

This table compares the overall rates of providers who provide alternative hour care with those who do not provide alternative hour care.

While Table 12 shows an overall rate comparison of providers that offer alternate hour care with those who do not, the table does not provide an alternate hour rate.

To get this information, the *2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey* asked child care providers who indicated they provided alternative hour care if they charged a different rate for alternative hours. The survey then asked providers for that rate. Of the 123 child care providers who responded they provided alternative hour care, only 35.0% indicated they charge a different rate for those hours. Providers who reported both standard and

alternative hour rates on the survey were analyzed for rate differences between age groups.

Rates should be interpreted with caution due to the low number of providers who charge a different alternative hour rate, the low number of providers who reported both a standard and alternative hour rate, and the inability to independently verify accuracy of rates in regard to alternative hour care.

All rates were converted into average hourly rates, which are represented in Table 13.

Alternative hour child care is needed, as only 7.4% of child care providers on the Child Care Market Rate survey report providing alternative hours. While most providers who do provide alternate hour care charge the same rate (65.0%), preliminary results indicate the difference between the standard and alternative hour rate for those who do charge a different rate for alternative hours could be substantial.

Accreditation

Child Care Aware of Kansas provided information about the accreditation status of child care providers. The accreditation status of providers by cost area is shown below in Table 14. Additionally, a rate comparison of accredited and non-accredited providers was conducted and is shown in Table 15.

Overall, nationally accredited child care providers charge more for services. The median of Family Child Care Providers who are not accredited is \$2.40/hr. while the median of those who are accredited is \$2.76/hr. The median of child care centers who are not accredited is \$3.03/hr. while the median of those who are accredited is \$4.33/hr.

The 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey also asked child care providers if they were nationally accredited. Just over 14.0% (14.4%) of Child Care Centers reported they were nationally accredited, while 12.4% of Family Child Care Providers reported accreditation. It should be noted that these numbers are higher than what has been gleaned from other sources. It is possible that some child care providers misunderstood what organizations are able to accredit child care facilities and these percentages should be considered with caution.

Child and Adult Care Food Program

Child Care Aware of Kansas provided information about child care providers' involvement in the Child and Adult Care Food Program (CACFP). Provider involvement in the CACFP by cost area is shown below in Table 16. Additionally, a rate comparison of providers involved in the CACFP and those not designated as being involved in the CACFP, or supporting other nutrition initiatives, was conducted and is shown in Table 17.

The 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey also asked child care providers if they participated in the CACFP program. Nearly 48.0% (47.7%) of Child Care Centers reported they did participate, while 70.7% of Family Child Care Providers reported participation.

Additional Funding and Program Participation

Currently, child care providers do not report to Child Care Aware of Kansas additional funding they receive aside from parent payments and the DCF Child Care Subsidy Program. Providers were asked about additional sources of funding in the *2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey*. Of the 811 providers who responded, 350 (43.2%) reported they received additional funding. The majority of funding reported was COVID/Pandemic Related, as 77.5% of Child Care Centers and 91.5% of Family Child Care Providers reported receiving funding for this purpose. Other prevalent sources of funding were the Early Childhood Block Grant (14.7% for CCC and 5.2% for FCC), Early Head Start (12.7% for CCC and 1.2% for FCC), and United Way (15.7% for CCC and 0.0% for FCC).

The extent to which child care providers participate in quality or other enrichment initiatives, other than what was captured above, is not known, as data from Child Care Aware of Kansas reported no program participation or special projects.

Additional Fees

Currently, child care providers do not report to Child Care Aware of Kansas additional fees that are charged to families. Providers were asked about additional fees in the *2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey*. Eight hundred and twelve (812) providers responded. Of those, 62.3% (137) of Child Care Centers and 23.3% (138) of Family Child Care Providers indicated they charge fees.

Two hundred and seventy-four (274) providers responded as to the type of fee they charge families. The top three fees for both provider types were:

- Late pick-up fee (71.5% for CCC and 85.4% for FCC)
- Late payment fee (84.7% for FCC and 56.2% for CCC)

• Enrollment/registration fee (81.0% for CCC and 50.4% for FCC).

A more detailed description of fees can be found in Appendix 9: Results of the *2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey*.

The 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey invited providers who charged additional fees to explain why the fee is charged and who is required to pay the fee. Consistency between child care providers and among families was apparent as fees appear to be distributed equally among families. With the exception of late payment fees, there were no differences noted between families who were receiving DCF assistance and those not on DCF assistance. A few providers indicated they allow families who receive the child care subsidy more time to pay than private pay families but it was the exception.

Discounts

The 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey asked child care providers about discounts offered to families. Three hundred and eighty-eight (388) providers responded they offered at least one discount to families. Of the providers who reported offering a discount, the following discounts were reported most often:

- Multiple child discounts (60.8% for CCC and 77.1% for FCC)
- Employee discounts (64.8% for CCC and 7.2% for FCC)
- Scholarships (22.7% for CCC and 3.8% for FCC)

While Family Child Care Providers were more likely to offer a multiple child discount, Child Care Centers were more likely to offer employee discounts, scholarships, income-based discounts, and discounts for families receiving the child care subsidy.

Knowledge of and participation in the DCF Child Care Subsidy Program

In the 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey, a series of questions were asked to obtain information about provider participation and experiences in the DCF Child Care Subsidy Program. First, providers were asked if they knew about the child care subsidy through DCF. Just over 84.0% (84.1%) of child care providers indicated they knew about the program.

Providers who responded they knew about the program were then asked if they participated in the DCF Child Care Subsidy Program. More than 77.0% (77.5%) of Child Care Centers and 63.6% of Family Child Care Providers indicated they do participate.

Reasons for not participating in the DCF Child Care Subsidy Program

Providers who did not participate in the program were asked to identify all of the reasons why they were not participating. The reasons most cited were as follows:

- Private pay families keep the child care full (19.0% for CCC and 45.7% for FCC)
- Families never ask for it (31.0% for CCC and 32.6% for FCC)
- It does not meet my lifestyle/business needs (21.4% for CCC and 22.8% for FCC)
- Signing up is not a priority at this time (23.8% for CCC and 22.3%)

Providers who previously participated but no longer participated were asked why they no longer participated. Thirteen (13) Child Care Centers responded and they indicated the top three reasons were: DCF denied participation (3); families don't need/ask for it (2); and they've had previous negative experiences (2). Seventy (70) Family Child Care Providers responded and they indicated the top four reasons were: Families don't need it/ask for it (28); difficulty collecting the balance from parents (14); DCF staff were not helpful (8); and eligibility is too difficult (8).

Feedback from Providers Who Do Participate in the DCF Child Care Subsidy Program Providers who participate in the DCF Child Care Subsidy Program were asked a series of questions about participation experiences and preferences.

Overwhelmingly, providers charge families the same regardless of DCF program participation. Just over 82.1% of Child Care Centers reported that families who receive DCF assistance pay the same rate as private pay families, while 92.5% of Family Child Care Providers said the same. There were no providers (0.0%), whether Child Care Center or Family Child Care, who indicated that families receiving the DCF subsidy paid more, on average, than private pay families. Providers reinforced this response when asked how they determine fees for families on child care assistance.

Providers were also asked if they experienced any challenges as a result of participation in the DCF subsidy. Thirty-three percent (33.0%) of providers reported they experienced challenges. Providers who noted challenges were asked to explain the challenges. The following challenges were reported most frequently:

- Difficulty collecting the balance from parents (78.4% for CCC and 76.5% for FCC)
- Parents do not want to pay the family share required after the DCF payment is calculated (72.5% for CCC and 61.8% for FCC)
- DCF payment rate needs to be increased (58.8% for CCC and 59.8% for FCC)
- Families fail to reapply on time (37.3% for CCC and 43.1% for FCC)

Providers who participated in the DCF Child Care Subsidy Program were also asked about information practices and preferences. The majority of providers indicated they shared the information (64.4% for CCC and 54.8% for FCC) they received from DCF with families, while more than a quarter of providers (28.8% for CCC and 26.2% for FCC) indicated they do not receive information from DCF. Some providers (6.8% for CCC and 19.0% for FCC) indicated they do not share information they receive from DCF with families.

When asked the method by which they would like to be notified, 90.3% of Child Care Centers and 81.8% of Family Child Care Providers indicated they would like to be notified via email. Providers indicated they would like to see the following types of information from DCF:

- Grants/Other programs available for providers (93.8% for CCC and 90.2% for FCC)
- Rate changes (81.3% for CCC and 84.6% for FCC)
- Program eligibility changes (85.7% for CCC and 81.3% for FCC)
- Information about changes in status for specific families (81.3% for CCC and 82.7% for FCC)

Enhancing the Provider Experience

The 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey asked child care providers what, if anything, could be done to make their experience more provider friendly. Fifty (50) Child Care Centers and 104 Family Child Care Providers responded. A thematic analysis was conducted on the responses and the following themes emerged. Child Care Centers were most likely to: indicate they had difficulty using the electronic payment system (8); and when payment transfers occur, suggest it would be helpful to know which payment was connected to which family (7). Family Child Care Providers were most likely to: reiterate the importance of communication when a child's eligibility changes (18); ask for help obtaining payment from parents (6); and request increased communication (6). Eight (8) Child Care Centers and 18 Family Child Care Providers wrote-in that their experiences with DCF have been positive.

Summary of Results at the 75th Percentile

The Maximum Subsidy Rate is the maximum hourly rate that DCF will reimburse a family based on facility type and age of child. The 75th Percentile Market Rate is the price at or below which 75.0% of child care providers reported charging for services and is the benchmark recommended by the Department of Health and Human Services for provider subsidy rates. Tables 18 and 19 compare the Maximum Subsidy Rate with the data provided by Child Care Aware of Kansas at the 75th Percentile Market Rate. Results are summarized by age group, provider type, and current DCF Cost Areas.

SECTION 5: RECOMMENDATIONS


Recommendations for Cost Area Changes

Proposed Cost Area Changes

To determine the accuracy of current cost area groupings of Kansas counties by hourly rate and type of child care provider, LTI created scatterplots showing the distribution of market rates for each cost area for providers that met the definition of full-time (50-55 hours per week; Monday-Friday). Calculations were made for Child Care Centers and Family Child Care combined and individually using both mean and median rates. Child Care Centers were also compared using weighted and unweighted age categories. Because of potential fluctuations due to small numbers (fewer than three providers), counties with less than three providers were not considered for area change.

Upon consideration of multiple analyses, LTI used the combined Child Care Center and Family Child Care median hourly rate, weighted by the number of providers in each type to guide recommendations for area changes. The figure below shows the distribution of the weighted Child Care Center and Family Child Care Provider median hourly rates per cost area and highlights recommended area changes.





Cost Area 1 is Johnson County with a weighted mean of \$4.40 per hour. Cost Area 2 has a mean range of \$2.23-\$3.08, and Cost Area 3 has a range of \$1.64-\$2.60. Based on the combined weighted mean, the following cost area changes are recommended:

- Move from Cost Area 3 to Cost Area 2:
 - Clark, Cheyenne, Harvey, Norton, Rush, Scott, and Seward Counties with weighted means that range from \$2.45 - \$2.60 which fall within the current Cost Area 2.
- Geary County was moved from Cost Area 3 to Cost Area 2 based on the *2017 Child Care Market Rate Analysis*. Current analysis shows a weighted mean rate of \$2.23 which lies in the Cost Area 3 range. Given the fluctuation, the recommendation is to leave Geary County in Cost Area 2 and continue to monitor rates to determine most appropriate placement.

Table 20 shows the counties listed in current cost areas compared to proposed cost areas. Based on current market rate data, making the proposed change(s) would result in more accurate cost area groupings.

Considerations for Future Market Rate Analysis

LTI submits the following for consideration by DCF:

- Future methodology should be conducted using both current definition of full time hours (50-55) and an expanded definition of full time (50+ hours) to determine the most appropriate and accurate representation of Child Care Centers and Family Child Care Providers across the state.
- Review and revise survey questions as needed to obtain more accurate information from providers. This may include requiring "yes" and "no" responses instead of answering only to respond "if yes". This will allow the distinction between a "no" versus a non or missing response.
- Consider adding definitions to questions that have had a large range of responses or do not coincide with external sources. An as example, the question about national accreditation on the survey revealed that more than 14.0% of Child Care Centers and 12.4% of Family Child Care Providers indicated they were accredited. This is not supported in the data provided by CCAKS, nor is it supported by information publicly available through those accrediting bodies. This indicates that child care providers may need additional clarification as to the definition of national accreditation. It is possible that some providers mistook the term accreditation for licensure, so examples of accrediting bodies in the next market rate survey is advised.
- Align CCAKS Child Care Center age categories with those used in DCF benefit data to allow for accurate subsidy calculations, especially for those in the two-year old age group.
- Encourage providers to submit the following information annually:
 - Updated contact information.
 - Reporting of provider rate many providers do not have a rate reported in the CCAKS database.
 - Reporting of provider hours for more accurate conversions between time intervals (hourly, weekly, monthly), request providers report average

number of hours care will be available per week as well as how many weeks a year care will be provided.

Results of the 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey

The following information represents the survey responses received from child care providers. In all, 1,031 surveys were included in the final sample. With the exception of the first question, Child Care Operational Status, which contains all provider responses, only providers who designated a provider type (Family Child Care or Child Care Center) are reported. While the highlights of the survey were included in the narrative of the report, this Appendix provides an opportunity to review each response in detail.

Child Care Operational Status

Providers were asked the question "Are you currently providing child care?" Of the 1,031 respondents, 97.7% (1,007) answered they were providing child care and 2.3% (24) answered they were not providing child care.

The following reasons were provided as to why they were not currently providing child care:

- Business complications due to COVID-19 (8)
- Personal reasons, such as retirement or health concerns (7)
- Only operate in the summer (3)
- Financial challenges (2)
- Are a preschool program (2)
- Lack of demand for child care in the community (1)
- Chose not to answer (1)

Nonprofit or For-Profit Status

Providers were asked the question "Are you a nonprofit or a for-profit program?" Of the 996 respondents, 28% (279) answered they were nonprofit and 72.0% (717) answered they were for-profit.

Infant Age Description

Providers were asked the question "What age do you consider to be an infant?" More than a hundred providers (15.3% or 138) indicated they did not provide care for infants. The majority of providers (45.8% or 414) consider an infant to be 0 months to 18 months, while 36.1% (326) consider an infant to be 0 months to 12 months. Just under 3.0% of providers (2.9% or 26) responded they considered an infant to be something other than previously described.

Providers were asked the question "What age do you consider to be a toddler?" Seventy-six providers (8.4%) indicated they did not provide care for toddlers. The majority of providers (33.1% or 299) consider a toddler to be 18 months to 36 months, while 20.6% (186) consider a toddler to be 12 months to 36 months, 16.6% (150) consider a toddler to be 12 months to 30 months, and 14.8% (134) consider a toddler to be 18 months to 30 months. More than 6.0% of providers (6.5% or 59) responded they considered a toddler to be something other than previously described.

Providers who responded they <u>did</u> charge additional fees were asked "Explain why the fee is charged and who is required to pay the fee (school age children, new families, all families who receive DCF assistance, families who do not receive DCF assistance).

Two hundred and forty-four (244) providers responded. One hundred and twenty-three (123) Child Care Center providers responded and 121 Family Child Care Providers responded.

The purpose of fees were self-explanatory, i.e. Late Pick-Up fees were charged to families who arrived late to pick-up their children and Credit Card fees were charged to families who chose to use a credit card.

There were some slight differences, however, in a few of the fees. Activity fees varied by age group, with the older ages more likely to pay an Activity fee. Additionally, some Registration fees were charged each year while others were only charged once upon initial admission. One provider charged her preschoolage families a technology fee for iPad usage.

With the exception of Late Payment fees, there were no differences noted between families who were receiving DCF assistance and those not on DCF assistance. Some providers allow families who receive the child care subsidy more time to pay the family share than private pay families.

Operational costs and wages, which were also collected on the 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey, are described in the supplemental report titled 2020 Kansas Narrow Cost Analysis: Supplement to the Child Care Market Analysis.

SECTION ONE: INTRODUCTION

The Kansas Department for Children and Families (DCF) designs and oversees programs to help Kansas families access child care services. One of these programs is the Child Care Subsidy Program that helps some families pay for child care costs. DCF subsidizes a portion of the child care expenses incurred by some low-income families. These subsidies allow low-income families to participate in training programs, attend school, or maintain employment. Child care rates are based in part on local market rates of child care, as determined by market rate analyses. These analyses are used to obtain rate information as well as other information about the child care setting. Since changes do occur within the market over time, a rate study is completed every three years.

DCF has contracted with the Learning Tree Institute at Greenbush (LTI) to analyze the local market rates of regulated child care throughout the state of Kansas. The analysis provides information on whether current state rates and cost area groupings are adequate to allow families equal purchasing power in the child care market. This year, LTI was asked to conduct a Narrow Cost Analysis in addition to the Child Care Market Rate Study. Unlike the Child Care Market Rate Study, which identified what families are paying for child care, the Narrow Cost Analysis can be used to help inform DCF and other stakeholders as to the actual cost of providing child care.

SECTION TWO: METHODOLOGY

Background

The 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey provides information on what providers are charging parents for child care in the state, however, it alone does not identify the associated costs of delivering child care services. In early 2020, Kansas Department for Children and Families (DCF) requested the 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey be expanded to include questions related to the actual cost of providing child care to allow for a narrow cost estimate. LTI reviewed 22 state reports for models of cost estimation. LTI and DCF agreed to frame the Kansas cost estimation, in part, based on the assumptions and questions used for a similar purpose in the state of Maine. While Maine did not develop a cost estimate model, information gathered was used to inform a future cost modeling analysis. The Kansas model attempts to provide a rough estimate of cost for Family Child Care Providers and Child Care Centers.

The additional questions were aligned with the inputs required for the <u>Provider Cost of Quality Calculator</u> (PCQC) ¹, which is a free tool offered by the U.S. Office of Child Care that allows states to model the annual cost and revenue for care at the child care facility level, demonstrating whether there is a gap between the cost of providing quality services and

the revenue available to support a provider. Questions were limited to specific areas that have the greatest impact on the costs and profitability of providing services, including 1) Staffing structure, 2) Personnel benefits, 3) Rent and mortgage, 4) Educational supplies, 5) Professional development, and 6) Uncollected revenue.

SECTION THREE: RESULTS

Staffing Structure and Personnel Wage Data for Family Child Care Providers

For the Kansas Narrow Cost Analysis, Family Child Care Providers included survey respondents who indicated licensure as a Family Day Care Home or Group Day Care Home, with up to 12 children. All Family Child Care Providers have at least one Owner/Operator. Family Child Care Providers typically do not have other staff to assist with care. About one-third of Family Child Care Providers have other full-time or part-time staff as shown in Table 1. With only one-third incurring other staffing costs, these costs are not included in the Family Child Care Provider cost for salaries shown in Table 2, nor are they included in the overall cost model shown in Table 19.

Staffing Structure for Child Care Centers

For the Narrow Cost Analysis, Child Care Centers include respondents who indicated licensure as a Child Care Center, Building Based School Age Program, Head Start Center, or Preschool. Child Care Centers vary widely based on enrollment size, so providers were asked on the *2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey* to indicate if they were a "small facility with an owner/director, and minimal or no additional staff", or a "larger facility with multiple staff". Table 3 shows the difference in staffing structure between self-defined small and large Child Care Centers.

While a definition of "small" and "large" Child Care Centers was provided to survey respondents based on staffing description, examination of the data indicated the staffing structure using these definitions did not reflect true differences in enrollment size. To more accurately report these differences for the purpose of this analysis, Child Care Centers were characterized as "small" if they had an enrollment of 10-24 children, "medium-sized" if enrollment size was 25-99 children, and "large" if enrollment size was 100 or more children. Table 4 shows the median number of positions across these staffing scenarios. The current Narrow Cost Analysis uses these breaks throughout the report in order to show differences between Child Care Centers.

Personnel Wage Data for Child Care Centers

The survey collected data on the number of positions and the wages paid to staff in each of the positions listed. Wage data included both the starting wages and highest wages paid for each position. The tables below provide the range of wage for each position by showing the median low wage and median high wage. The average of the two was calculated to get an estimate at the 50th percentile. These estimates were then multiplied by the median number of positions to calculate a total cost per position. A total across all positions provides an estimate of personnel wage. Tables 5 through 10 summarize the total personnel wages aggregated both by size and cost area for Child Care Centers.

*Note: When child care providers were asked to respond to wage data based on their facility size, those who identified as small facilities received fewer positions from which to choose, while those identifying as larger facilities received a larger set of positions. Because the maximum capacity of the facility was ultimately used in analysis and not the self-described "small" and "large" designations, the aggregation was different than the initial design. The biggest consideration being that smaller facilities were asked about an Owner/Operator position while larger facilities were asked about a Director position. Because there were discrepancies in the reported wages of Owner/Operators and Directors, the decision was made not to combine the two. It is likely that for-profit Child Care Centers may have an Owner/Operator and a Director, while non-profits likely only have an Owner/Operator. This does affect the analysis, especially as both positions are calculated in costs.

Wages were also aggregated by DCF cost areas, which are calculated according to average provider charges for child care. Cost Area 1 has the highest rates charged and represents providers in Johnson County. Cost Area 2 represents the following counties: Butler, Douglas, Ellis, Geary, Jefferson, Leavenworth, Miami, Pottawatomie, Riley, Sedgwick, Shawnee, and Wyandotte. Cost Area 3 providers are those that have the lowest rates and include the remainder of Kansas counties.

Initial analysis reveals the Cost Areas align with the reported cost to provide child care. Table 10 shows Cost Area 1 reports an overall higher wage than Cost Area 2, with the lowest wages reported in Cost Area 3. Since wages make up the largest portion of child care costs, this finding indicates the cost of providing child care is highest in Cost Area 1 and lowest in Cost Area 3.

Employee Benefits by Provider Type

The survey collected data on benefits that providers make available to their staff, including health insurance and retirement benefits. Table 11 presents the distribution of benefits offered for both Family Child Care Providers and Child Care Centers, with some Child Care Centers offering benefits but very few Family Child Care Providers offering benefits, either to themselves as owners or to their employees. This correlates to data presented earlier in the Staffing section. Family Child Care Providers typically do not have staff other than themselves and are unlikely to provide those benefits.




Figure 1: Distribution of Benefits Offered by Child Care Center Size

Table 12 and Figure 1 reflect how the percentage of Child Care Centers offering benefits increases with size, with large-sized Child Care Centers providing a much larger percentage of staff with benefit options. Survey respondents indicated, regardless of Child Care Center size, dental benefits were the most likely offered/provided for staff.

Some providers chose to write-in additional benefits in the "Other" category. One Family Child Care Provider reported "discounted child care", one reported "retirement", and one reported "small bonuses/gift cards" as a benefit. Child Care Centers reported "disability", "401k", "discounted child care", "cafeteria plan/flexible spending account", "life insurance", "college tuition assistance", "professional development scholarships", "vacation", "KPERS", "uniforms", and "long-term care" as benefits.

Health Insurance Estimates

Providers were asked to report the average dollar amount their organization contributes toward health insurance each month, per employee. Table 13 shows the percentage of providers who contribute to health insurance costs as well as the median monthly amount paid. Although only four Family Child Care Providers offer health insurance, their average contribution was higher than that of Child Care Centers.

Figure 1 represents the percentage of child care providers who report offering those benefits. Large-sized Child Care Centers are more likely to offer benefits than medium-sized or small Child Care Centers.

Leave Time

Providers were asked to report the number of paid days of leave annually for five categories of leave (holidays, vacation, sick/personal, professional development and "Other"). If leave was not offered, they were instructed to leave the box blank.

As illustrated in Table 14, the majority of Family Child Care Providers (57.4%) and Child Care Centers (65.6%) provide paid leave for holidays. Less than half pay for vacation, sick, or personal leave. Child Care Centers are much more likely to pay staff for days attending professional development than Family Child Care Providers. The median days of leave across both types of care were similar with Family Child Care providing 10 days of vacation compared to 7.5 for Child Care Centers, and Child Care Centers providing more sick/personal days (7) compared to Family Child Care Providers (5).

In the "Other" leave category, 12 Family Child Care Providers (1.6%) stated they provide bereavement leave. One provider included "COVID quarantine", another stated "school holidays", and one included "acts of God" such as earthquake or power outage.

Four Child Care Centers (1.5%) listed bereavement leave in the "Other" category. Other leaves were reported once by Child Care Centers, and included: "birthday leave", "jury duty", "maternity leave", "optional holidays", and "winter break".

Additional Expenses

Staff Professional Development

The survey collected expenses pertaining to staff training and development over the past 12 months. As illustrated in Table 15, the survey found that more than 90.0% of Family Child Care Providers and Child Care Centers reported they paid for staff training. The amount spent on employee training increases with Child Care Center enrollment size and number of staff positions, with large-sized Child Care Centers spending approximately \$18,000 per year, medium-sized centers spending approximately \$2,000, and small centers, about \$300. Family Child Care Providers report spending approximately \$110 annually.

Educational Supplies for Children

Providers were asked how much their program spent on educational supplies and learning experiences for children in the past 12 months. As shown in Table 16, the median amount spent for Family Child Care Providers and small Child Care Centers was comparable and under \$1,000, while both medium-sized and large-sized centers report spending more than \$7,400.




Figure 2: Percentage of Child Care Expenses Offered at No Charge to Families

In addition to expenses related to staff training and development and education supplies, there are a number of child care expenses that providers incur that are often provided at no additional charge to families. Table 17 and Figure 2 show the percentage of providers offering supplies and services at no additional charge. The vast majority of Family Child Care Providers and Child Care Centers supply, but do not charge additionally for: art supplies, snacks, milk, and meals. Diapers were the supply provided to families least often by both provider types.

While these estimates cannot be considered an indication of quality alone, a more comprehensive look into professional development of staff and educational expenses associated with developmentally appropriate practices could be used as a potential measure of environmental safety and child care quality.

Another future consideration for assessment of safety and quality is the Quality Rating and Improvement System, known as *Links to Quality* in Kansas. The pilot for this program was completed in the summer of 2020 with 42 child care providers. Statewide implementation has not yet occurred. This quality initiative may be an area for consideration in future cost estimation models, especially as it pertains to the effects of professional development on safety and quality of care.

Rent/Mortgage by Provider Type

To estimate the rent/mortgage cost associated with child care facilities in Kansas, the minimum requirement for square footage per child and approved maximum allowable number of children allowed were used in the calculation. The Child Care Licensing division of the Kansas Department for Health and Environment (KDHE) requires Family Child Care Providers have a facility large enough to allow for 25 square feet per child and requires Child Care Centers to have facility large enough to allow for 35 square feet per child. Based on the maximum allowed number of children for each provider, LTI calculated the required square footage per facility. Child Care Centers have an additional square footage requirement for infants of 30 square feet to maintain the required distance for cribs. For this reason, 30 square feet per infant was added to the square footage for Child Care Centers based on their desired capacity and vacancies for infants.

In addition, the square footage of kitchens and bathrooms were estimated based on

research and consultation with those understanding child care facility development and design. The Narrow Cost Analysis uses the following standard sizing: combined kitchen and bathroom square footage of 330 for Family Child Care Providers (up to 12 children), 680 for small centers (10-24 children), 800 for medium-sized centers (25-99 children), and 1,380 for large-sized centers with 100 or more children. The PCQC calculation is based on \$14 per square foot/month for child care rent and mortgage. Using this industry standard, LTI added square footage per child, estimated kitchen and bathroom areas, multiplied by \$14 per square foot/month, and then multiplied the total by twelve to obtain a total cost estimate for provider rent and mortgage.

Table 18 shows the annual rent and mortgage cost estimates by provider type and size. Estimated mortgage and rent costs vary widely according to facility size, with Family Child Care Providers having the lowest costs and large-sized Child Care Centers incurring the highest costs.

Estimated Uncollected Parent Fees

The final consideration for cost in the analysis was an estimate of uncollected parent fees. Typically, these fees are considered "bad debt", which are accumulated when families leave a child care facility owing a balance and the provider has been unable to collect payment. The industry standard for uncollected revenue is 3.0% of revenue. This estimate was added to the cost estimates for salaries/wages, health insurance, professional development, educational supplies, and rent/mortgage.

Total Cost Estimate

Table 19 shows calculated estimates for the Narrow Cost Analysis based on responses from the 2020 Child Care Market Analysis Survey and application of industry standards. Please note that the cost estimates provided in the current Narrow Cost Analysis are likely conservative as they do not include expenditures for taxes, maintenance, utilities, attorney/accounting fees, and other expenses that could vary substantially by provider type and region. A more comprehensive Cost Analysis would need to be conducted to capture these costs.

In addition, the median value was used for most estimates. While appropriate, the median value is often more conservative than the mean, which can be impacted by outliers in the data. It is also important to note that salary data for many key positions were reported below that of the national average.

^{*}Note: While less than 1.0% of Family Child Care Providers and 25.0%-55.0% of Child Care Centers report offering health insurance, these costs have been added to the estimate to more accurately portray costs associated with a quality child care facility. Health insurance costs were calculated by multiplying the average yearly contribution by the number of full-time positions (mean) according to provider type.

Limitations

The narrow cost estimates provided are subject to several assumptions, limitations, and potential biases. First, the survey data are based on child care provider responses. Not all child care providers responded to the survey, so the data may not be representative or reflective of the actual values or costs to provide child care. While sample size was adequate, many providers did not answer specific questions related to costs which further reduced responses needed to obtain estimates. Lastly, the wording of questions may have been confusing or hold different meanings for providers.

There were several assumptions that had to be made to allow for cost estimation. The first assumption was calculation of square footage for rent and mortgage. While research was conducted and those understanding child care facility development and design were consulted, and numbers seem adequate, there is not currently a standard way to accurately measure these costs. The second assumption was the application of 3.0% of total cost for uncollected revenue based on PCQC standards. We do not currently have a way to know if 3.0% is a realistic number for Kansas child care providers.

Because the cost estimates provided are likely conservative, as they do not include expenditures for taxes, maintenance, utilities, attorney/accounting fees, and other expenses, a more comprehensive Cost Analysis could capture these costs. Despite these limitations, LTI has attempted to provide an accurate, yet conservative estimate of child care costs for providers in Kansas.

Introduction & Background

Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) Lead Agencies were required to complete a Narrow Cost Analysis in their three-year CCDF state plan, running FY22 through FY24. Kansas Department of Children and Families partnered with Prenatal to Five Fiscal Strategies to complete an analysis meeting the requirements of the Narrow Cost Analysis. We are pleased to present this memo as the detailed report of the Narrow Cost Analysis which estimates the cost of care (including any relevant variation by geographic location, category of provider, or age of child) necessary to support (1) child care providers' implementation of the health, safety, quality, and staffing requirements, and (2) higher quality care.

The Narrow Cost Analysis process meets the <u>CCDF State Plan</u> requirements; the Kansas Narrow Cost Analysis is detailed herein following the questions in the FY 2022 – 2024 CCDF Plan:

- a. Describe the methodology the Lead Agency used to conduct, obtain, and analyze data on the estimated cost of care (narrow cost analysis), including any relevant variation by geographic location, category of provider, or age of child (98.45 (f)(ii)). [See Section I]
- b. Describe how the methodology addresses the cost of child care providers' implementation of health, safety, quality and staffing requirements (i.e. applicable licensing and regulatory requirements, health and safety standards, training and professional development standards, and appropriate child to staff ratio, groups size limits, and caregiver qualification requirements (98.45 (f)(ii)(A)). [See Section II]
- c. Describe how the methodology addresses the cost of higher-quality care, as defined by the Lead Agency using a quality rating and improvement system or other system of quality indicators, at each level of quality (98.45 (f)(ii)(B)). [see Section III]
- d. Describe the gap between costs incurred by child care providers and the Lead Agency's payment rates based on findings from the narrow cost analysis. [see Section IV]

I. Methodology

Prenatal to Five Fiscal Strategies (P5FS) developed a customized Excel-based cost model to conduct this narrow cost analysis. This model uses the same methodology as the Provider Cost of Quality Calculator (PCQC), the web-based cost modeling tool provided by the federal Office of Child Care that has been approved for use in subsidy rate setting. By developing an Excelbased model, P5FS created a customized tool for Kansas that can account for the unique context of the state.

Like the PCQC, the cost model developed for Kansas helps users understand the discrete costs of delivering child care services, with differences in cost related to the type of provider and the age of the children served. The model integrates the cost of meeting Kansas child care licensing standards and additional costs related to higher-quality care, aligned with the state's pilot Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS), called Links to Quality, and aligned with Early Head Start standards, which the state implements in Early Head Start-Child Care Partnership



settings. The tool also integrates revenue data, specifically the state's payment rates under CCDBG, to analyze the cost of care in relation to the available subsidy payment rates.

The cost model relies on several data sources, drawing from Kansas specific data if available supplemented with PCQC defaults where necessary. PCQC default data was used for nonpersonnel data in the model, with the national averages adjusted to account for the cost of living in Kansas. Tables A1 and A2 in the appendix provide details for all non-personnel expenses in the model. Table 1 details the primary data sources used in the cost model.

The cost model allows users to estimate the cost of care for a program of different sizes, serving different age children and in a child care center or family child care home, meeting health, safety, and licensing requirements. Additionally, the model allows user to understand the impact of differences in salaries and benefits (health insurance, paid sick days and paid leave) on the cost of care, as well as the impact of higher-quality requirements related to the Links to Quality QRIS pilot and Early Head Start standards.



II. Addressing the cost of meeting state standards

The Kansas child care cost model reflects the standards that licensed child care providers are required to meet. P5FS reviewed these standards to determine the cost drivers to include in the model. Primarily these costs are driven by child to staff ratios, group size limits, and caregiver qualifications. The cost for educators to participate in annual training and professional development, at 16 hours per year, were also included in order to meet licensing requirements and health and safety standard. Occupancy costs for a facility that meets the square footage requirements detailed in licensing were also included.

Full details of the cost drivers in the child care cost model are included in Table A3 in the appendix. Table 2 details the ratio and group size data used in the model.

In addition to classroom staff, the model includes non-classroom administrative staff including a full time Program Director as required by state licensing, as well as an Assistant Director in programs serving over 150 children, and an Administrative Assistant, at either part time or full time depending on the program size in order to provide sufficient staffing to operate the program. This aligns with staffing patterns reported by providers in the 2020 Market Rate Survey.

Data from the market rate survey illustrated that many programs do not offer health insurance or paid time off for their staff members. However, the default in this narrow cost analysis includes the program contributing to the cost of health insurance at the amount of \$3,700 per year per staff member, which is the average amount reported by providers in the Market Rate survey who do offer health insurance. The model also includes 8 days paid sick leave and 8 days paid vacation.

With personnel the largest cost driver in a child care program, the salary choices made in the model are the most significant driver of cost. In using the cost model to complete this narrow cost analysis, two salary options were considered. One aligns with data collected in the market rate survey, reflecting current salaries as of 2020. The second option draws data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics for Kansas, aligned with the default option in the PCQC. As part of the narrow cost analysis the model therefore enables costs to be considered at each of these salary levels. Table 3 details these two salary options for each position category used in the model.

While family child care providers are small business owners rather than employees and often do not pay themselves a salary, the cost model includes a salary for the provider/owner to ensure that the cost estimate includes sufficient resources to compensate the provider for their work. The cost model makes no determination that providers must pay a salary, but the cost per child results include sufficient resources to compensate the provider/owner at this level. In the cost model developed for this narrow cost analysis, the provider/owner salary under the Market Rate Survey Data option is drawn directly from responses in the market rate survey. For the Bureau of Labor Statistics Data option, the salary is set at the same level as a lead teacher in a center-based setting.

The study team considered differences in cost of care by geography but ultimately decided to model a single statewide cost. As the largest cost driver, the study team considered if salary data should vary across the state which would in turn be a primary driver in a regional approach to the cost estimate. Data from the 2020 Market Rate Survey did show differences in salaries across the three cost regions Kansas uses for setting subsidy rates, with salary expenses highest in area 1 and lowest in area 3. However, the size of these differences varies significantly based on position. For example, Program Director salaries in cost area 2 are 21% lower than in cost area 1. However, Lead Teacher salaries are 34% lower in cost area 2 compared to cost area 1. In addition, many salaries reported in the market rate survey are below the federal minimum wage when calculated on as a full-time salary (2,080 hours/year).

This data points to the limitations of using current salary data when estimating the cost of care. The way that child care programs are funded means there is often a strong link between the resources available to child care programs providers and what they can pay their staff. Therefore, personnel costs might be lower in cost area 3, but that could be driven by the fact that providers in cost area 3 receive a subsidy payment rate that is approximately 41 percent lower than in cost area 1. This points to the cyclical nature of setting subsidy rates based on market prices, which P5FS has written about <u>previously</u>, where salaries are driven by subsidy rates, which in turn results in lower reported salaries in areas with lower rates. Upon consultation with DCF, P5FS opted to build a statewide salary into the model, reflecting providers across the state being required meet all the same requirements, and that the



additional cost of living in urban areas might be offset by the need to pay higher salaries to attract staff to rural areas. As shown in Table 3, the model includes salary data from the market rate survey, as a statewide average, but also includes salary data from the Bureau of Labor Statistics which is higher than currently reported salaries in the market rate survey and therefore would represent increased resources for providers in all cost regions.



III. Addressing the cost of higher-quality care

Kansas has a pilot Quality Rating and Improvement System (QRIS), <u>Links to Quality</u>. While not fully implemented, Links to Quality provides a frame for understanding the cost of higher-quality care. P5FS reviewed the draft Links to Quality standards to identify potential cost drivers. Based on this review, the study team identified the need for additional non-classroom staffing to support activities required to meet the draft Links to Quality standards, the need for dedicated non-student contact time for teachers, and some additional costs related to family engagement activities.

In addition, Kansas has supported the development of <u>Early Head Start-Child Care Partnerships</u> in the state and Head Start Program Performance Standards are often lifted up as being a benchmark of quality. Therefore, the study team also integrated the Early Head Start applicable standards from the Performance Standards into the cost model to analyze the cost to meet these standards, as a higher definition of quality.

Finally, this narrow cost analysis includes increased compensation for the early childhood workforce at higher levels of quality. Significant bodies of research have identified teachers as the primary driver of quality in early childhood programs. For programs to be able to recruit and retain professional educators, they need to be able to provide competitive compensation, including benefits. The cost model includes the option to run scenarios with higher compensation – aligned with Bureau of Labor Statistics data – and to include an increased contribution to health insurance and additional paid time off.

Full details of the additional cost drivers related to Links to Quality and Early Head Start can be found in Table A3 in the appendix.



V. Gap between costs and current payment rates

To compare costs across scenarios and isolate the impact of specific variables, the study team created a default size and age composition for a child care center and a family child care home. The default programs serve children infants through school age and operate full day, full year schedule. As shown in Table 4, in the child care center setting, the total capacity is based on one classroom of each age group, for an average program size of 89 children. In the Early Head Start Scenario capacity is reduced to 71 children to account for lower group sizes required under the Head Start Performance Standards.

As shown in Table 5, the default family child care program serves five children birth through five and three school age children for a total capacity of eight children. In the Early Head Start Scenario the total number of children is reduced to six, aligned with Head Start Performance Standards, with four children birth through five, and two school-age children.

P5FS used the Kansas child care cost model to estimate the cost of care under several different scenarios. A total of 12 scenarios were developed, with results generated for programs meeting (1) Base licensing requirements, (2) Links to Quality draft standards, and (3) Early Head Start standards. Neither the Links to Quality draft standards, nor the Early Head Start standards include a salary scale so no specific salary requirements related to each of those scenarios is included in the base scenarios. However, in order to recruit and retain staff in a high-quality program, where staff might be asked to take on additional responsibilities, such as completing child assessments or developing individualized lesson plans, P5FS modeled each of these scenarios with higher salaries. As such, scenarios were run using both market rate survey



salaries (i.e. the current salaries), and Bureau of Labor Statistics salaries, which represent a 46 percent to 118 percent increase. Table 6 summarizes the scenarios presented in this narrow cost analysis.

Each set of results is compared to the subsidy rate in each of the three cost regions, allowing a full understanding of any variations in gaps between the estimated cost of care and the current subsidy rates across the state.
