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Introduction: Kansas' Commitment to Technical Bulletin (TB) 14

Kansas is currently implementing its approved CFSR PIP and remains committed to strengthening safety, permanency, and well-being outcomes. TB14 provides an opportunity to consolidate existing improvement efforts within a streamlined framework that focuses on system-level impact, and the overall goal of A Home for Every Child.

To do this, Kansas will be leveraging and monitoring existing strategies in a coordinated manner that is intended to directly influence the home-to-child ratio. Kansas' TB14 approach is organized around the two primary drivers of that ratio:

1. Reducing the number of children entering and remaining in foster care.
2. Strengthening the recruitment and retention of foster homes aligned with child needs.

Through the Program Improvement Plan (PIP) under Technical Bulletin 13A, Kansas has focused on strengthening safety determination, prevention utilization, permanency practice, and system coordination through practice model implementation, case review learning, and cross-system collaboration. Technical Bulletin 14 builds on this foundation by organizing these ongoing improvement efforts around measurable population-level outcomes that influence the home-to-child ratio. The sections that follow outline the goals, strategies, and monitoring approach Kansas will use to advance these outcomes during the pilot period.

Technical Bulletin 14 Goals

Goal A (Children in Care):

Kansas will reduce the number of children in foster care preventing unnecessary entries into foster care and support timely, safe exits from foster care.

Goal B (Family Type Placement and Capacity):

Kansas will strengthen family type placement availability by recruiting and retaining the homes needed for Kansas children and improving support and placement stability through targeted supports.

Strategies and Initiatives to Impact Goals

Kansas recognizes that the foster home-to-child ratio is influenced by both the number of children entering and remaining in foster care and the number of available, stable foster homes. The strategies outlined below are designed to influence those drivers by strengthening safety determination and prevention utilization at the front door, improving placement stability during care, accelerating safe permanency leading to release from custody, and strengthening foster home recruitment and retention for children in care.

By aligning implementation support with defined monitoring measures, Kansas intends to ensure that workforce practice improvements translate into measurable population-level trends.
